CPASF Travel Award **First Recipients Named**



In December 2016, Ed Hawkins, President Emeritus, donated a \$1,000 travel award for 10 years for CPASF scholars to attend conferences. Both Ben Schrager (2015-2017) and Junichi Yagi



(2016-2018) each received a \$500 award. Ben is researching how the tension between industrialization/anxiety and tradition/trust

is reshaping agro-food networks. He notes, "There are clear distinctions in chicken meat branding that correlate to higher levels of consumer anxiety or trust. Imported chicken is viewed with the highest levels of anxiety which is somewhat lessened for domestic chicken broilers while the domestic jidoribranded chicken inspires the highest levels of trust."

Krieg (2016-2018) Xander wrote in an update: "...since the data has all been collected, the main activities this year will be doing data analysis and writing papers. Over and above that, I



will continue to give presentations at conferences and schools, as well as continue volunteer counseling." Xander is working on a paper whose purpose is "to use a machinelearning algorithm to identify and predict social anxiety with elements from a social situation (e.g. interacting with authority, meeting strangers, etc.). Situational features (71.39%) better explained social anxiety as compared to intrapersonal factors (53.8%) and demographic information (48.88%). All of this is well-known in theory, but rarely tested due to methodological limitations."

Sakiko Yasuda (2013-2015, Ph.D Public Health 2016) is working for UNICEF in the East Asia and Pacific Regional Office in Bangkok as a Junior Professional Officer on
