### **Awards Ceremony at the Japanese Consulate**

Prince The Crown Scholarship Akihito Foundation (CPASF) held a ceremony on July 27, 2018 at the Japanese Consulate in Honolulu to scholarship present awards to Mr. Yoshiro Sakamoto and Mr. Robert Oda. Mr. Allen Uyeda, CPASF Chairman, made the presentation on behalf of the CPASF board.

**Mr. Yoshiro Sakamoto** received an MA degree from the Tokyo University of Foreign

Studies and is a PhD Candidate in Literature and Cultural Studies at the same university. His dissertation research is regarding the life and literature of Mr. Stefan Baciu, a prominent poet and literary promoter of post-war literature in Hawaii. Mr. Baciu was a professor of Latin American literature at the University of Hawaii-Manoa and resided in Honolulu for about 25 years until his death in January 1993. Yoshiro has participated in exchange programs in Switzerland and Romania where he gathered research material, conducted interviews. etc. concerning Mr. Baciu. He will focus on the significance of the poet's literary works and activity in the 20th century during his stay at UHM as a visiting researcher.

Mr. Robert Oda received his BS degree in physics and computer science from McGill University in Canada. Currently, he is a PhD candidate in the Molecular Biosciences and Bioengineering department at UH Manoa. He conducts his research at the John A. Burns School of Medicine under the guidance of Dr. Bruce Shiramizu. He will be studying Raman Spectroscopy at the University of Tokyo with Dr. Yasuyuki Ozeki. current research interests are in using Raman Spectroscopy to determine chemical differences in cancerous cells and tissue.

# Hiroshima Peace Scholars Program

The Honolulu Star-Advertiser reported that **Naomi Hirano-Omizo** (1975-1976) co-authored the Japanese language textbook,



"Adventures in Japanese" along with Hiromi Peterson (another Punahou school teacher). Through the royalties from the sale of their textbook, they have funded the Hiroshima Peace Scholars Program which has been providing annual trips to Hiroshima for the past 10 years.

This year, two students from Punahou School and Farrington High School traveled to Japan for the August 6, 1945 anniversary of the U.S. bombing of Hiroshima. The Hawaii students met with Japan students at the Hiroshima Peace Memorial to promote peace and commemorate the anniversary of the bombing.

say as the day approached, I grew particularly nervous over both my Japanese language abilities and making some mistake in etiquette or the like. These feelings only grew as our meeting date drew closer. When I met with Their Majesties, however, I was immediately struck by their warm welcome. The room was quiet and pleasantly lit with sunlight.

Their Majesties were both soft-spoken, very kind and sincere. I was humbled by their compliments on my language ability. What left the strongest impression on me, however, was the genuine interest Their Majesties expressed in my research. Such undivided attention and lack of judgement is not a regular experience for me, and it was truly a gift.

We're now accepting applications from American scholars who are interested in applying for the 2019-2020 scholarship year. The award covers one-year of study in Japan with an option to apply for a additional year. The total value of the award is \$45,000 which includes a \$30,000 scholarship award and a \$15,000 annual allowance. Deadline to apply: November 2, 2018

The scholarship is open to American graduate students at UH Manoa pursuing study in a subject area leading to better understanding between Japan and the U.S.

All applicants must either appear before a Screening Committee in person or on Skype if they are not in Honolulu on November 26, 2018.

Finalists must either appear before the Crown Prince Akihito Scholarship Foundation Board of Trustees in person or on Skype if they are not in Honolulu on December 13, 2018.
