Final Audience with Emperor Emeritus Akihito

On August 8, 2019, Robert Oda (2018-2020) and Hiroko Saito (2019-2021) had the honor of meeting with Ms. Carolyn Glassman, Minister Counselor for Public Affairs, at the American Embassy in Tokyo. Hiroko writes, "Ms. Glassman explained that there were various efforts and programs to promote the cultural exchange between Japan and the U.S. and she encouraged me and Robert to contribute to them through our research."



After the visit at the Embassy, the scholars headed to the Keidanren escorted by CPASF Chair Allen Uyeda. There, they met Mr. Howard Hamamoto (CPASF Chair Emeritus and CPASF Trustee) who would also be accompanying them during the main event for the day, the Imperial Audience with Emperor Emeritus Akihito and Empress Emerita Michiko.

This was a special day indeed as this would be the final Audience with Their Majesties as as Emperor Emeritus Akihito abdicated on

Hiroko writes:

While waiting for Emperor Emeritus and Empress Emerita in the room for the Audience, I was nervous as well as excited about this once-in-a-lifetime experience. I was also worried about how well I would be able to explain my research until Emperor Emeritus and Empress Emerita came into the room and began the conversation with a warm welcome greeting.

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The following is an excerpt written by Robert describing his experience:

It has taken me quite a bit of time to gather my thoughts about the whole experience (I am still in shock and, quite frankly, in some state of denial that it actually occurred); but at the end of the day, I have come to fully appreciate the experience and now recognize how amazing it was.

Their Majesties are extremely gracious people. Before we met them, we were standing in the meeting room and waiting for them to arrive. While waiting, I was sweating so much from sheer nervousness: "How should I stand?"; "How do I greet them?"; "Am I presentable enough?" These were the thoughts that churned through my head.

But once they entered the room and introduced themselves to me, all my fears

Chairman's Message

Emperor Emeritus Akihito is a tremendous role model for those consciously thinking about how best to live one's life. Born into a society steeped in tradition, His Majesty defined his own path even as the arc of his life intersected with global change, and at times, turbulent events.

He was the first Emperor to marry a commoner and the first in 200 years to abdicate his throne. His Majesty's reign, known as 'Heisei' (Achieving Peace'), focused on mending relationships with victims of Japan's wartime aggressions while balancing constraints placed on him by Japanese law and expectations from the outside world.

Together with Empress Emerita Michiko, his Majesty demonstrated courage and determination early on in public life; during a visit to Okinawa in the mid 1970s, Their Majesties narrowly escaped a Molotov cocktail thrown at them at the Himeyuri war memorial. Undeterred, they continued the visit with their planned schedule. Their Majesties won the hearts of the Japanese people with their efforts to comfort and encourage people in the aftermath of severe disasters including the 1995 Kobe earthquake where their Majesties broke with tradition to kneel before survivors.

Emperor Emeritus Akihito's reign included extended periods of political turmoil (with more than 15 prime ministers within the first two-and-a-half decades of his reign), a prolonged economic slowdown and severe financial crisis, and a deadly nerve gas attack by a radical group. Not only did His Majesty persevere, he inspired his country by his leadership and compassion.

As we face an increasingly chaotic world, Their Majesties provide an example of how we can meet these challenges with courage. grace and humility and a willingness to create new paths forward.

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
High Honors for CPASF Trustee

CPASF Trustee **Robert Huey** received an Imperial award, "Order of the Rising Sun, Gold Rays with Neck Ribbon" at a ceremony at the Consulate General of Japan in Honolulu on July 10, 2019. The award, which is one of the highest for a non-Japanese citizen, was presented to Dr. **Huey** for his contribution to the development of Japanese studies in the U.S. and for strengthening the friendly relationship and mutual understanding between Japan and the U.S.

Former CPASF scholar **Gay Satsuma** (1993-1994) and Associate Director of UH Manoa's (UHM) Center for Japanese Studies stated that, "UH has been fortunate to have a phenomenal teacher like Dr. **Huey**. This award recognizes his accomplishments, contributions and commitment to teaching and mentorship, and really building the infrastructure necessary for us to have a world-class Japanese studies program at the University of Hawaii.

The award covers one-year of study in Japan with an option to apply for a additional year. The total value of the award is \$45,000 which includes a \$30,000 scholarship award and a \$15,000 annual allowance. **Deadline to apply: November 5, 2019**
