#### **Challenges of the Ongoing Pandemic**

Like so many other plans in this COVID-19 pandemic environment, our CPASF scholars were forced to pivot and change their plans for study/research under our CPASF scholarship program.

Returning Japanese scholar **Hiroko Saito** (2019-2021) has been in Hawaii since starting her program with us. She did not return home to Japan for even a short visit for fear of not being able to return due to quarantine restrictions in both Japan and in Hawaii.

Our 2020-2021 American Scholar, **Leah Wasil**, has deferred starting her program in Japan until the pandemic subsides. Right now, most universities in Japan are not accepting incoming foreign students on their campus due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

New Japanese scholar **Katsuhiko Kitada** (2020-2022) decided to stay home in Japan and take his online classes at UH Manoa on the advice of his Academic Advisor. He will hopefully be able to arrive in Honolulu next semester but that will depend on the current situation with the pandemic at that time.

The CPASF is committed to remaining flexible in the Administration of our scholarship as we try to assist our current and incoming CPASF scholars in this challenging environment. Our priority is the health and safety of our scholars.

Our hope is that the pandemic settles down soon so that our scholars will be able to travel to Hawaii and Japan to start their programs where they intended to.

### **Positivity and Productivity Amidst Uncertain Times**



New 2020-2021 American scholar **Leah Wasil** writes: Seven months into the new decade, the COVID-19 pandemic continues to disrupt institutions of higher learning.

At the individual level, the pandemic has caused a disruption in my own ability to start dissertation research. As COVID-19 cases continue to rise, institutions in both the United States and Japan are taking measures to lessen the negative impact on students.

To name an example, Sophia University in urban Tokyo will not be allowing students to depart for study abroad in Fall 2020 and is unlikely to be accepting international students. What is more, other major universities across Japan are likely to follow suit and the Japanese government is rumored to be considering restricting access to Tokyo, Chiba, Saitama, and Kanagawa prefectures. Given this context, I made the informed decision to postpone my travel to Japan until 2021.

This decision, however, came with great difficulty. When I received the CPASF award in January 2020, I planned to leave for Japan in September. The strict timeline I set to complete my doctorate had little room for delays, and I was certain that with dedication

and hard-work I could meet this goal.

While the decision to delay my research was disappointing, I have also found positivity and productivity amidst uncertain times. Newfound freedom in working from home has opened up time to develop my professional skills through non-traditional avenues.

I will be submitting proposals for presentation to both the Association for Asian Studies Conference and the Society of East Asian Archaeology Conference on UNESCO and Japanese Archaeology for the 2021 conference season. I will also continue to attend virtual conferences and workshops. Lastly, I will continue to develop my Japanese language proficiency through virtual conversation groups with friends in Japan.
